PROGRAMME NOTES -

The programme this evening is structured in three parts, beginning with music for Advent that tells the story of the Annunciation and speaks of the coming of Christ, calling us to be watchful and alert. A cappella anthems by Kerensa Briggs and Paul Manz provide reflective moments between the more rousing works by Andrew Carter and Felix Mendelssohn, before we all join together to sing the triumphal, Hail to the Lord's Annointed. George Malcolm's Missa ad Presepae, the "Mass at the Crib", is a mainstay of Midnight Mass in most Canadian Anglican churches. A charming work that remains relatively contained and reserved except for the occasional outburst of joy, I chose it as the centrepiece of this evening's concert to bring a little bit of home across the pond. This section ends as we collectively reflect on the holy birth with O Little Town of Bethlehem.

The final third of this concert features carols for Christmas by a diverse array of composers, sung as if by the side of the crib. A rarelyperformed work by Arthur Sullivan opens the section, before we hear a new carol by Trinity College Choir countertenor (and accompanist for this concert) Jonathan Watts. Healey Willan's stunning arrangement of a traditional French carol and a modern composition by Yshani Perinpanayagam follow, before the concert ends with Paul Halley's rousing setting of The First Nowell.
